A Few Issues of Note

But Looking Forward to a Great Summer Season

I am pleased to advise that everything has settled down staff-wise and with reticulation maintenance. With the coming summer months everything is on track for the pool opening and commencement of the reticulation season.

Please take steps to ensure the reticulation system on your property is working properly by checking it during the Sunday tests. This is essential to ensure your own property, the neighbouring property, and other homes on the same station are receiving adequate water and pressure.

A recurring problem is dogs roaming unleashed. In recent weeks there have been a number of dogs wandering the parks that appear to have escaped from their homes. Please, if you have a dog that gets out of your yard take steps to prevent this from happening.

If you are walking your dog in the parks please ensure that it is kept on a leash as required by council regulation. Please note that the rangers regularly do patrols of the parks at various times to monitor for stray dogs and those not on leashes.

Another issue of concern has been a few instances of teenagers causing explosions, generally in the underpasses. They start a small fire using rags, old clothing or bits of paper then put an aerosol can on it. The heat causes the gas to expand and the can explodes. Our gardener, Grant, has found a number of aerosol cans around the parks and gardens. So I would ask that if you see anyone carrying aerosol cans, old clothes or paper ring the police on 13 14 44 and report it.

Should you become aware that some type of explosive device has been detonated in a home yard or park on the estate please contact the gardener and let him know. An incident was recently reported to the Committee where an explosion propelled a bottle out of a yard into the park at the rear of the home.

Parents please take the time to speak to your children and explain the dangers of mixing of chemicals or experimenting with explosives. This could result in fire, physical injury from flying debris, burns and permanent disability or disfigurement to the person or persons causing the explosion or to passersby.

Parks & Reticulation

One other person I wish to thank is Taffy for making herself available to come in and sort our reticulation out after the mainline replacement. As was expected, the replacement line and redesign has increased pressures in all stations. It took time to run tests on these stations. After this we had to swap a few houses from their old stations to new positions. These people have been notified of the changes and hopefully will be happy with the better pressure. Here's hoping we have a good reticulation season.

On Saturday the 26th the parks were sprayed for clover and bindii. We know this was done late in the season but with the rain we have had this winter it was hard to get it done. Thanks to MultiTurf for giving their Grand Final Day up to do the job for us.

The only other thing I wish to ask is that all residences take a look out their back fence and please clean up the strip of land between the path and back fence. This has always been a problem area for us to control. Grant is having trouble in some places when blowing down the paths after mowing. This also causes a problem for people who walk in the parks.

To finish I would like to thank everyone for their help. Now it is time for the warm days to roll on. It has been a cold wet winter, much needed for our water supplies. However, enough is enough.

Security Lighting

Security lighting helps prevent crime

Burglars do not like to be seen. Keep your home well lit with security lights or garden and porch lights. This is one of the simplest steps you can take to protect your home.

Which type of lighting is best for you?

There are many types of security lighting products on the market and what is right for you will depend on many factors such as your budget or size of your house.

Movement activated lights are often an ideal, cost-effective solution. Mount both the light and the sensor out of reach so intruders cannot easily damage them.

External Lighting

Use lighting around your home that is activated by movement sensors. These are designed to come on when someone walks outside your home after dark.

Secure meter box

It makes little sense to go to the trouble of installing security lighting if your meter box is insecure. Fit a locked, meter box with a viewing window. This can be accessed by you and your electricity provider.

Office of Crime Prevention

Safe Handling of Potting Mixes, Garden Soils and Composts

Potting mixes, composts and soils can be harmful to your health if you do not take some simple precautions. A group of organisms, called Legionella, is found in these materials and can cause serious illness. Legionella longbeachae is one species known to cause a type of pneumonia infection in humans. The information below will help you avoid the disease.

Symptoms of Legionella infection

Legionella infection usually develops two to ten days after exposure and some or all of the following symptoms may be experienced:

 fever / chills / a cough which may be dry or may produce sputum / aching muscles / headache / tiredness / loss of appetite / diarrhoea

It is always difficult to distinguish Legionella infection from other types of pneumonia by symptoms alone and other medical tests are required to diagnose the disease.

How to avoid Legionella infection

Due to the widespread use of potting mixes, soils and other garden products, there is no guaranteed way of stopping infection. However, these simple precautions should be followed when handling such materials:

- Always wear gloves
- Keep the mix damp while in use
- Avoid inhaling the mix
- Wash your hands thoroughly after use

How is Legionella organism spread

Recent studies show that the most likely cause of transmission of Legionella longbeachae is from hand to mouth. I may also be possible that Legionella infection is contracted by breathing in fine particles of dust or water carrying the organism but this is not proven. Unlike other micro-organisms, Legionella infection is not contagious.

Who gets Legionella infection?

People of any age may be infected. However, the disease is opportunistic. It often affects middle aged and older persons and those whose immune system is weak. There is an increased risk of acquiring this disease if you smoke, have chronic lung disease, diabetes, HIV or if you are on certain long-term medication. Legionella infection is not limited to gardeners but the use of potting mixes, composts and other soils puts them at greater risk.

Can I be infected by Legionella more than once?

Tests show that your body is able to develop immunity against a second infection, but how long immunity lasts is unknown. It is, therefore, important to take care at all times.

Can the growth of Legionella organisms be prevented?

Legionella micro-organisms occur naturally and are widespread in the environment. There is no known way of preventing Legionella from multiplying in composted bark, sawdust, plant and vegetable materials or other finished potting mixes and garden soils.

When working in your garden remember ...

Always wear gloves Keep the mix damp while in use Avoid inhaling the mix Wash your hands thoroughly after use

Committee Business:

Parks and Reticulation: Work on the reticulation mainline is now complete. Discrepancies in the diameter of the pipes has now been corrected. This may require juggling of stations to accommodate possible water pressure changes. Taffy is to be asked to work for three days to run tests with the current gardeners.



The 'lost' cross pipe has been found, remapped and connected. Bore 3 won't start on auto, and this is to be checked by an electrician. The pump for Bore 5 is now back in and ready for connection.

The asbestos mainline pipe has been checked and appears to still be in very good condition. The wiring also looks good. This has raised the question regarding the necessity of further mainline replacement work. The replacement programme is now in review. If no further money needs to be used for mainline replacement, should this then be redirected to the construction of limestone walls for the underpasses?

In reply to questions from Crestwood, the Water Corporation indicated that no increase in water allocation is available without an increase in land area. Additionally, Crestwood will be required to fit water meters at some point in the future. A notice will also be provided regarding renewal of our water licence.

The timing of lights in the park has been adjusted. Further follow-up on replacing the murals in our underpasses is to be made with Thornlie Senior High School next year.

Aesthetics: A letter is to be written to the City of Gosnells to advise of the intention to remove a tree in Princeton Court.

Follow-up is being made on two issues of complaint: a fence in disrepair and a patio exceeding the building boundary.

Pool: The Winter programme has run ok. Work is soon to begin on preparation for pool passes for the coming season.

Finances: Note was made of the retirement of Ron Halperin of HFM Legal. Aranaea Ayers will now be responsible for Crestwood matters. The contact person still remains the same: Jennifer Clemmence.

Social: A family oriented event is scheduled for Sunday, 20 September, from 2pm. Volunteers will be required to help run the event.

General Business: An appendix of important dates and information is to be prepared by the Secretary as information becomes available.

A policy on staff use of computers is still to be prepared and the stocktake is still to be completed.

August 2009

Committee Business:

Parks and Reticulation: Further issues regarding Graeme Singleton came to light prior to his dismissal. Soon after he was let go, he sent an email to the Committee which was replied to. A new contract has now been made for Grant Douglas as full-time gardener with the probation period not relevant in this instance.

Watering tests have been done for the parks with tests for the stations still to be completed. The pressure release valves have to be adjusted.

Requests have been made for the spraying of bindii and clover. After discussions on this matter, MultiTurf is to be asked to spray for Bindii.

Aesthetics: One request for information on fence replacement was made and the relevant information and form have been provided.

Pool: Pool pass request forms were distributed with the July-August issue of the *Crestwood News*

Finances: Discussions were held regarding the honoraria to be provided for those helping with the running of the estate. For consistency, a decision was taken to make such honoraria set at a percentage of annual fees. For the editor of the *Crestwood News* this was set at 40% and for the Crestwood Hall Hire coordinator, 20%.

General Business: An explosion fuelled by aerosol cans occurred in Underpass B. The incident was reported to the police who are to visit the Thornlie Senior High School. The culprits are believed to be students from the school.

Trevor Davis expressed thanks for the flowers received.

RECIPES

Barbecues for Summer

Barbecued Beef Ribs

Ingredients

1.5 kg beef ribs

Marinade

- 2 tbs soy sauce
- 6 tbs olive oil
- 2 tbs hot mustard
- 1 tbs lemon juice
- ½ tps chilli powder
- 1 clove garlic, crushed



thick slices of onion freshly ground pepper

METHOD

- 1. Cut ribs into serving pieces. Place in a deep bowl.
- 2. Combine soy sauce, oil, mustard, lemon juice, chilli powder, garlic and pepper. Pour over marinade and wedge a few slices of thick onion between pieces of beef. Marinate for 24 hours, turning from time to time.
- 3. Barbecue over hot coals for about 20 minutes or until done.

Serves 4-6

Orange Flavoured Pork Spareribs

Ingredients

1.5 kg pork spareribs

Marinade

- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup orange marmalade
- ½ cup orange juice
- ½ cup white wine
- 2 cloves garlic

½ tps ground ginger

METHOD

- 1. Place ribs in a shallow dish.
- 2. Simmer all other ingredients in a saucepan until slightly reduced. Pour over ribs and marinate for several hours. Drain and dry ribs. Reserve marinade.
- 3. Barbecue spareribs for about 1½ hours or until golden brown. Turn and baste regularly with reserved marinade.
- 4. Serve on a bed of watercress and sliced oranges.

Serves 4

Barbecued Tuna Steaks

Ingredients

4 thick tuna steaks

Marinade

¼ cup teriyaki sauce

- 2 shallots, chopped 1 ths oil
- 2 tps minced, fresh ginger

½ tps grated orange rind



METHOD

- 1. Place tuna steaks in a single layer in a shallow pan.
- 2. Combine teriyaki sauce, shallots, oil, ginger and orange rind. Pour over fish. Marinate 45 minutes, turning occasionally. Remove the fish, reserving the marinade.
- 3. Place fish on the grill about 18 cm from hot coals. Brush frequently with reserved marinade. Cook five minutes on each side or until fish flakes easily with a fork.

Serves 4

Barbecued Chicken Thighs

Ingredients

4 chicken thighs

Marinade

3/4 cup teriyaki sauce

1/4 cup unsweetened pineapple juice.

METHOD

- 1. Bone chicken thigh, leaving skins intact. Rinse and pat dry. Place in a large plastic bag.
- Combine teriyaki sauce and pineapple juice. Pour mixture over chicken in bag, press out the air and tie up.
- 3. Refrigerate for 8 hours or overnight, turning the bag occasionally. Remove chicken from marinade and place on barbecue about 20 cm from moderate coals. Cook about 45 minutes or until a meat thermometer inserted into the thickest part registers 85°C. Turn frequently.

Serves 2

Butterflied Leg of Lamb

Ingredients

11/2 kg leg of lamb, butterflied

Marinade

½ cup olive oil

½ cup lemon juice

2 tbs red wine vinegar



- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 tbs fresh parsley, chopped
- 1 tbs fresh oregano leaves (½ tsp dried)

METHOD

- 1. Place lamb in a large shallow dish. Stir in remaining ingredients and refrigerate for several hours or overnight.
- 2. Remove leg and reserve marinade. Barbecue lamb until tender. Brush with reserved marinade.

The ranger told me that the Council want to prosecute every case like this and would have preferred to have used the \$10,000 option on the previous attack, but we insisted he keep the fine to the minimum of \$1,000 on that occasion.

Something needs to be done about this situation before someone is really injured, including small kids that play in their gardens at the front and rear of their houses.



Controling MosquitoeS



There are almost 100 species of mosquitoes in Western Australia and many of them can be serious pests, interfering with leisure

time and outdoor activities. Mosquito bites cause discomfort and pain, particularly to babies and others with sensitive skin. Only female mosquitoes bite. They need blood to be able to develop their eggs. While taking blood, infected mosquitoes can pass on disease-causing viruses and parasites. Exposure to large numbers of mosquitoes may increase the chance of being infected with a mosquito-borne disease.

Mosquitoes breed in standing water, such as may occur in old car tyres and other water-holding containers, pot-plant drip trays, septic and water tanks, roof gutters, domestic ponds, etc. By eliminating these breeding sites you can help to permanently reduce mosquito numbers in your backyard.

During summer the life cycle from egg to flying adult mosquito takes 7 to 10 days. In colder months the life cycle may take several weeks.

You can help eliminate breeding areas in your backyard

- » Dispose of all containers which hold water.
- » Keep ornamental ponds stocked with mosquito-eating fish, e.g. goldfish. Keep the margins free of vegetation.
- » Keep swimming pools well chlorinated and filtered and free of dead leaves.
- » Fill or drain depressions in the ground that hold water.
- » Vent pipes on septic tank systems must be fitted with a mosquito proof cowl. Seal all gaps in the lid and ensure leach drains are completely covered.
- » Screen rainwater tanks and/or add paraffin oil to cover the surface. Ensure guttering does not hold water.
- » Empty pot plant drip trays once a week or fill with sand. Empty and clean animal and pet drinking water once a week.
- » Some pot plants (especially bromeliads) hold water in their leaf axils. These should be emptied of water once a week.

Residual pyrethroid sprays, e.g. deltamethrin, permethrin, can be used to further reduce nuisance mosquitoes. However, this should not replace the prevention of backyard breeding which is much more effective.

Avoid being bitten

- » In your house, make sure all doors and windows are screened. Doors should be self-closing and open outward.
- » When camping, screen your tents, use repellents containing DEET and wear protective clothing.
- » When participating in outdoor activities, take protec-

tive measures when mosquitoes are most prevalent.

» Recognise and avoid **areas of mosquito activity**, such as swamps, salt marshes and billabongs.

Disease

Worldwide, mosquito-borne viruses and parasites are major causes of human and animal sickness and death. In WA, the main mosquito-borne diseases of concern are:

1. Ross River Virus

Infected people may develop a disease called Epidemic Polyarthritis, commonly known as Ross River virus infection. Symptoms may continue for several months or even years in unlucky individuals. In epidemic years, there may be hundreds of people affected in WA.

2. Barmah Forest Virus

This virus appears to be a relatively recent introduction to WA and causes a disease with very similar symptoms to Ross River virus infection.

3. Australian Encephalitis

This is a rare but serious disease occurring in the northern half of WA. In severe cases, brain damage or paralysis or death may result.

4. Dog Heartworm

This disease of dogs is caused by a parasitic worm which, in large numbers, can clog the heart and seriously affect the blood flow.

5. Malaria and Dengue Fever

Two other diseases, malaria and dengue fever, have previously occurred in WA and could be reintroduced given the right conditions. In the case of malaria, travellers should protect themselves from mosquitoes while overseas and take malaria tablets. The mosquito which carries dengue virus is no longer in WA and is less likely to be reintroduced with the elimination of backyard breeding areas.

What are local and state governments doing?

The Health Department of WA in collaboration with local government conducts mosquito control programs in areas where mosquitoes are suspected of carrying disease. However, in spite of these programs, Ross River virus and Barmah Forest virus will always be a threat because they occur in natural cycles between mosquitoes and animals, and it is simply not possible to eliminate all mosquitoes. Therefore, it is important for people to take personal measures to reduce the risk of contracting disease and to reduce the breeding of nuisance mosquitoes.

What You Need to Know About BUSHFIRES

Bushfires are, unfortunately, a common occurrence throughout Australia during the hot summer months. All of us remember vividly the scenes which played out on television of the Victorian bushfires less than a year ago. While bushfires may come close to Thornlie. it is extremely unlikely that homes in Crestwood will be threatened by such an event. It is, nonetheless, informative to know how such fires may threaten homes, and what to do in case you are caught up in such a situation, if not while at home, then possibly while on holidays. The following information was taken from the FESA brochure, *Should I Stay or Should I Go*.

Bush Fires Are Dangerous

Bush fires are a natural part of the Australian environment, however, they can be extremely dangerous and can pose a threat to lives and property. To help protect you and your home against a bush fire, it is important to understand some important facts.

Fuel

During the hot bushfire season, bushland is covered with vegetation that provides fuel for fires — long, dry grass, parched native shrubs, dead leaves and twigs. Around the home, dried grasses, leaves, twigs and bark provide fuel for a fire. The fuel contributes to how hot the fire becomes (its intensity) and how fast it spreads.

Embers

While the fire front may not reach your home, It can still be damaged by burning embers carried on strong winds.



Embers landing on materials that easily burn are often the cause of small fires around the home.

Gaps and openings in roofing, walls, evaporative air conditioners, windows

and doors allow embers to enter your house and start a fire. Research has shown that ember attack is the main reason that houses ignite during a bush





fire and embers continue to be a risk for some time after the fire front has passed.

Radiant Heat

Bush fires generate extreme heat. This radiated heat can kill people,

plants and animals. It is the main cause for loss of life in a bushfire. Radiant heat may not directly ignite buildings, however, it can crack and break windows which will allow embers to enter.

Direct Flame Contact

Direct flame contact can occur when materials next to

the house ignite resulting in flames touching the outside of the building. The length of time that direct fire contact lasts depends on the amount of fuel there is to burn.

Wind

Generally, strong winds accompany bushfires. As the wind increases, so does the fire's intensity. The wind pushes flames closer to unburnt fuel, making the fire travel faster. Embers and other burning materials are also carried by the wind which can have a damaging effect on homes several hundred metres from the fire front.

During a Bush Fire it is Common for the Following Events to Occur

- Before the main fire front approaches, your home will be surrounded by showers of sparks and embers. This may continue for several hours. Embers will collect in corners and will need to be extinguished.
- It is likely that there will be strong winds. As the fire gets close, burning leaves and bark will begin to land around you.
- Thick, heavy smoke will make it dark and visibility will be poor. Breathing may also be difficult. Your eyes may become sore and reddened.
- It will be very hot and you will need to wear protective clothing.
- Noise generated by the fire will be very loud and some people will find this disturbing. You will hear the burning, crackling and roaring of the fire combined with the roaring of the wind. The sounds and
 - sirens of emergency vehicles may also be heard.
- Services such a electricity, telephone and water will most likely be interrupted.

Can you discover the meaning of the words in Hindi? There are specific techniques you can use to do this. Two of the easiest are repetition and minimal difference. For repetition, you look at sentences in which just one word or phrase is repeated. For minimal difference, you look at sentences or phrases which differ in only one way. There is also word position and remainder. For word position, you look to see if a particular type of word always occurs in the same position in the sentence. (You look at the language you are trying to identify, not English!) And then there is remainder: the only word left in a phrase or sentence after the other words have been identified.

Hindi is a member of the Indo-European family of languages and as such is distantly related to English which is also a member of the same group. It is spoken across the northern part of India and has as many as 350 million speakers. There is a distinction in Hindi between long and short vowels. Long vowels are marked with a macron: \bar{a} is a long a. Tense is shown by the addition of a word to the sentence and is not shown by a change to the verb as in English. There is no word for is in Hindi, although there is a word in the Hindi sentence indicating that this auxiliary is in present tense.
