Recent correspondence from the Committee of the Crestwood Homeowners Association.

Aesthetics

- 1. [A residence on Regency Drive] Thank you for your Building Approval Application form to erect a new patio. With your application you have included, plans, builder's details and the City of Gosnells building licence. This being all the documentation the Crestwood Committee requires, I am able to approve your application. We hope all goes well with your project.
- 2. [A residence on Regency Drive] Thank you for your letter of 3rd November 2010 and application to erect a tubular steel fence to increase the height of your boundary fence from 0.4 to 1.6 metres. Your proposal conforms to Crestwood's guidelines and is approved. We hope that the new fence will give the security you require.

Building work at underpass D has been finished. The reticulation is now in place and working and the gardens have been planted with native shrubs. Unfortunately, some miserable soul has added light green graffit to the new retain

miserable soul has added light green graffiti to the new retaining walls. Gosnells City Council has been informed and it hopefully will be removed in the near future.

Glyphosate spot spraying has been completed in all the parks, garden beds and on footpaths and the reticulation is working normally. Since we have had a very dry winter there are some places which seem not to be getting enough water. Because of this the parks will get 45 minutes of water per cycle instead of the usual 30 minutes.

Lots of bark has been collected from the parks. Luckily most bark-shedding trees are getting to end of the shedding season. The path between parks 21 and 22 has been repaired.

or personal reasons, Barry has been unable to continue as the committee person responsible for the pool. We thank Barry for the work he has done for us in the last few months. We are now in need of someone who is willing to take on the pool committee position. Please talk to any current committee member if you are interested.



The pool season is up and running with good numbers using it. Unfortunately, there was a breakdown in communication between the Committee and Belgravia Leisure, our pool managers. This resulted in the pool not opening as indicated in the schedule provided to residents. This has now been resolved and from all reports everything is going well.

The toddlers pool opening was delayed initially because the tilers did not lay the correct size dolphin on the floor. As a consequence the pool water could not be tested when the City of Gosnells health inspector checked the main pool before it opened. Belgravia (and, therefore, Crestwood) has been waiting for them to return and check the toddlers pool.

Once we are given the all clear from a health perspective it will be opened. On Monday, 29 November, it was brought to my attention that a couple of tiles at the edge of the pool had fallen off. Belgravia are attending to the repairs as quickly as possible but I would ask that you and your children be careful and report to the lifeguard on duty any tiles that move or seem loose.

Remember that on Christmas Eve, 24 December, there will be an inflatable in the pool for everyone's enjoyment.

INCIDENT REPORT

Incidents reported on the Crestwood Estate

There have been a number of incidents on the Crestwood Estate and residents are reminded to be alert and aware that crimes of opportunity, often carried out by teenagers transiting the parks, can occur at any time. If you are in the garden or garage make sure your front and back doors are locked. It only takes a moment for a thief to enter a house and steal a handbag or wallet. Entry can also easily be made through low, unsecured windows. It pays to be careful.

Burglaries were reported in Crestwood on Regency Drive and Princeton Court.

PERSONAL SAFETY

The general and specific tips outlined below are more related to the security of women, although many of the commonsense security items relate to both men and women.

General safety tips to avoid being attacked

- ... Stay alert and aware of your surroundings at all times. If you feel unsafe, remove yourself from that location.
- ... Practise or visualise what you would do in a real lifethreatening situation and consider taking self-defence lessons.
- ... Tell your family, friends or colleagues where you are going and the time you expect to be returning. If you change your plans, let them know.

You have the right to defend yourself

If you are attacked, you have the right to defend yourself. However, the law does not allow you to carry a weapon. Consider carrying a personal alarm or whistle in your hand for immediate use or program your mobile phone with a speed dial to someone who could help you in an emergency. Program the police 000 number or the number of a close friend or relative.

Reporting assaults

If you have been assaulted, call the police as soon as possible. If you have been physically or sexually assaulted, be aware that washing, showering, changing clothes or cleaning up in any way can destroy vital evidence that could lead to the apprehension and conviction of the person who violated you.

Police will ask you to give a clear account of exactly what happened. If you have taken painkillers, sedatives or drunk alcohol this could affect your memory. Try to avoid alcohol or medication until after you have reported the offence.

By taking action you are helping yourself and protecting others.

Safety in public places

Here are some general safety tips to protect yourself in public places:

- ... Walk in well-lit and busy areas. This provides more opportunity for natural surveillance.
- ... Avoid walking close to overgrown bushes or trees where a potential offender could hide.
- ... Walk against the flow of traffic to prevent vehicles driving slowly alongside you.
- ... Walk with a friend or group wherever possible.
- ... If you regularly walk by yourself, consider varying your route so your routine is not easily identified.
- ... Plan ahead How are you going to get home?
- ... Walk at a steady pace. Body language is an effective means of promoting confidence.
- ... Remain alert and be aware of your surroundings.
- \dots Turn down the volume on your iPod or earphones so you can

Your vehicle and personal security

Here are some tips when using your motor vehicle.

- ... Check the surrounding area before going to your car and check your back seat before getting in. Being aware of your surroundings allows you more time to react if there is an incident. Have someone accompany you to your car. This can stop people getting into your car without permission.
- ... Lock your doors after entering or leaving your car and drive with the doors locked.
- ... Have your keys ready before you get to the car.
- ... Consider storing your handbag or valuables in your car boot rather than on the passenger seat while driving.
- ... Be careful when stopping for broken-down cars, at accidents or in dark and isolated areas. Only stop if you feel safe to do so.
- ... Turn off your ignition if you are leaving your car unattended.
- ... If you car breaks down, try to turn off the road and put on your hazard lights. If someone stops, remain locked in your car and if you do not have a mobile phone and have not already called for help, speak to them through a small opening in the window. Ask them to call the police, an auto club or some assistance specified by you. Try to get the vehicle registration number and description of the driver and look for distinguishing features if possible. This can assist with investigations if a offence occurs.

Taxi safety

- ... Book a taxi from inside the venue before you leave.
- ... Use a secure taxi rank where available.
- ... If you have to wait outside, choose a well-lit area with other people present.
- ... Ask friends, the building security or management to escort you to the taxi.
- ... Remain at the taxi rank until the taxi arrives.
- ... For future reference, make a note of the car registration number or the driver's identification number.
- ... Let a friend or family member know your destination and where you are leaving from.
- ... Drivers have the right to ask for payment in advance, and if you pay with a credit card or e-ticket, make sure to ask for a receipt.
- ... Drivers may refuse to transport you if you exhibit antisocial behaviour.

Committee Business:

Parks and Reticulation: Rob Wilson has noted that the parks are looking untidy. Grant is to be approached regarding weeds throughout the parks.

Mention is to be made in the President's report for the next newsletter about the area at the rear of fences being the responsibility of homeowners.



The reticulation timetable is to be printed and distributed before October 4. Some house valves have stuck open during recent testing. A complaint was made to the Department of Water by a resident outside the estate, Fertilising of lawns is to be completed with the testing of sprinklers. Bore 3 has been tripping out and needs to be checked.

Underpass D work is not completely to plan with a problem of digging for foundations close to the side property. Changes were made to the concreting and rockwork finish.

Damyn has been offered part-time work at \$15 per hour during a three month probation period, and then \$16.00 after this period is over. He has dislocated his shoulder and in not able to cover all his duties until this has healed.

Pool: Barry tendered his resignation due to health and personal reasons.

Trevor Davis is to follow-up on the signing and lodgement of the agreement with Belgravia Leisure. A certificate of currency is still required from Belgravia. A letter of introduction from the new pool managers is to go out with the next Crestwood News. The lifeguards are undergoing training with reference to the particular issues found at Crestwood.

Refurbishment of the toddler pool is currently underway and water testing for the pools has been arranged prior to opening day. Pool passes are to be printed by Snap Maddington. VacSwim forms will be available from the pool office after opening day.

Aesthetics: Further follow-up is required regarding the cyclone fence at the rear of a property on Spencer Road.

Finance: There has still been no follow-up on the cost of rates for the parks owned by Crestwood.

Trevor Veen has suggested looking again at the possibility of installing solar panels to offset power costs. A letter has been sent to a homeowner regarding a shortfall in payment of fees.

Social: A coordinator to organise social activities is still required. A new resident has shown some interest in the position. George Putland is to be approached about organising Christmas Carols in the Park.

October 2010

Committee Business:

Parks and Reticulation: Mike Bernoulli was welcomed onto the committee as the new member for Parks and Reticulation. He has been provided with electronic copies of the gardeners' agreements and has been given the keys.

Damyn has accepted the offer of part-time work. He has been provided with a copy of the agreement and will be on three months probation.

The Department of Water has requested further changes be made to our ground water licence to include information relating to all properties serviced by Crestwood bores. Trevor has now visited the Department with the requested information. A new copy of the licence is expected when the changes have been completed.

Pool: The busy bee went smoothly and there were good numbers at the pool on opening day. The lifeguards have been instructed to "act like a parent" when dealing with issues relating to pool users. Crestwood is waiting for a reply from Belgravia regarding the original agreement that needs to signed and formalised.

There is a problem with the size of the dolphin motif in the toddler pool. Belgravia has been asked that the pool be retiled to meet the design of the original quote. The heating system for the toddler pool is also leaking. A quote has been requested for repair or replacement. Further delays in the opening of this pool are expected.

Aesthetics: An application form has been provided for the erection of a carport in Grenadier Drive. Discussions were also held with the homeowner on Lachlan Road interested in converting a carport to a garage and making some further additions.

Other topics discussed were the leaning rear fence on Grenadier Drive and anticipated removal of a temporary fence on Spencer Road.

Social: George Putland is willing to coordinate with the Thornlie Church of Christ regarding Carols in Park scheduled for 19 December. Sandra will coordinate the visit of Santa Claus on the same afternoon.

Trevor Davis will check with Trevor Veen and Belgravia about the use of the pool inflatables A flyer is to go out to residents before the next newsletter with information about Christmas and pre-Christmas activities.

General Business: A complaint was received regarding cats wandering about an harassing caged birds. Kym Murray will follow up on possibilities for exercise equipment in parks. Marjan will be approached again regarding names on boards in the hall.

Junior Pool Passes

Junior pool passes are provided to homeowner's children aged 10-17 years. No child under the age of 10 years will be admitted to the pool without a responsible adult to supervise. No exceptions will be made.

Daphne has been very generous in preparing pool passes for children who celebrate their tenth birth-day during the Summer when the pool is open. These passes will be provided after the child's parents have completed an appropriate application form available at the pool office.

Junior pool passes will **not** be available to any resident before their tenth birthday.

IT'S TIME TO STOP FEEDING OUR RAVENS

The black Australian raven, also known as the black crow, is normally found in rural areas where their presence is beneficial. In this, their natural environment, carrion is one of their main sources of food and their population density is approximately one breeding pair per square kilometre.

With the expansion of Perth this situation has dramatically changed. These birds have adapted to coexisting with humans and their distribution in the metropolitan area can be as high as 20 breeding pairs per square kilometre. This is especially true in the vicinity of schools where they find ample food supplies by scavenging in rubbish bins.

Within Crestwood the number of ravens has dramatically increased in the last two decades due to three nearby schools and the existence of a number of suitable nesting trees. Along with this increase there has been a decrease in the number of smaller native birds. Ravens have been observed during the Spring waiting for the eggs of these smaller native birds to hatch. Once hatched, they promptly swoop down and empty the nest in seconds. Adding to this problem is that several Crestwood residents are known to regularly feed these ravens, thereby adding to the increase in their numbers and a consequent reduction in the number of smaller native birds.

Ravens have enough to eat without supplementing their food supply and encouraging excessive breeding. You can help restore a natural balance by **not feeding** these birds.

A minimum cleaning charge of \$150 will be taken from the bond if the hall is not cleaned to a satisfactory standard.

Fruit Mince Cream Cheese Pie

Serves 8

Preparation This pie has three layers – one of fruit mince, another resembling a smooth cheesecake, and a topping of sour cream.

Ingredients

375 g cream cheese

2 eggs

½ cup sugar

Grated peel of 1 lemon

 $1~{
m tbs}$ lemon juice

2 cups fruit mince

Baked 22 cm pastry shell

- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 tbs sugar



½ tps vanilla Lemon slices

Method

- 1. Beat together cream cheese, eggs, ½ cup sugar, lemon peel and lemon juice with an electric mixer until very smooth.
- 2. Spoon fruit mince into the baked pastry shell. Pour the cream cheese mixture evenly over the fruit mince.
- 3. Bake in a 180 degree oven for 20 minutes. Mix together the sour cream, sugar and vanilla.
- 4. When pie has baked for 20 minutes remove and spread sour cream mixture evenly over the top. Return to oven for 10 minutes.
- 5. Chill pie before cutting and serving. Garnish with twisted lemon slices and lemon leaves just before serving

At the last AGM, some residents complained about vehicles speeding along Crestwood streets, particularly on Regency Drive. This matter was raised with the City of Gosnells, and as a result of this initial correspondence a traffic survey was conducted on Grenadier and Regency Drives. Crestwood has received further correspondence from the City with the results of this survey. What follows is an abridged and edited form of this letter.

Dear Mr Davis.

A traffic survey has now been completed in Grenadier and Regency Drives which are both classified as Local Access Roads under the Council's adopted Road Network Hierarchy, and would be used by local traffic generated by residents and service vehicles.

The results of the traffic survey for Grenadier Drive show that the average weekday traffic volume is 129 vehicles, which is low considering the maximum desirable volume for this class of road is 3000 vehicles per day. The average operational speed recorded was 47.5 km/h which is lower than the posted speed limit of 50 km/h.

Results of the traffic survey for Regency Drive show that the average weekday traffic volume is 415 vehicles which is low considering the class of road. While the average operational speed was 51.5 km/h is marginally higher than the posted 50 km/h it is typically lower than similarly classified streets within the City of Gosnells.

With regard to the "hoon" behaviour in Grenadier and Regency Drives, anti-social behaviour such as this is difficult to stop through traffic calming measures. These dangerous driving practices should be reported to the local police, preferably with licence plate details, so that enforcement of the Road Traffic Code can be implemented. Our experience is that these issues are generally undertaken by one or two drivers, and can be stopped through police enforcement of the Road Traffic Code and/or discussing the issue directly the offenders.

The City produces a *Dob in a Hoon* brochure (see box) which is a joint project between the City of Gosnells and the WA Police Service. This provides local residents with the opportunity to report antisocial driver behaviour and excessive vehicle speeds. This has proven extremely effective in reducing hoon behaviour in the City. This brochure is available at the Gosnells libraries, the City Council offices and the Police Department.

Crash statistics obtained from Main Roads WA show that in the five year period from January 2005 to December 2009, a total of four mid-block crashes were reported in the whole length of Grenadier and Regency Drives, not including intersections.

With respect to the above information, the City does no have any plans to install any traffic calming treatments on these streets at the present time. However, both streets will be monitored and appropriate action will be taken accordingly.

Dob in a Hoon

Antisocial behaviour and speeding by some drivers on our roads, who cause damage, disturb the peace and can threaten the safety of our neighbourhoods, should not be tolerated in the City of Gosnells.

There is tough legislation available to police to deal with the hoons responsible and stop these incidents from happening. However, police often need public assistance to deal with these matters.

What are the penalties for hooning?

Under the Road Traffic Amendment (Hoons) Act 2009, for offences which include:

- ... Driving in a reckless manner
- ... Burnouts
- ... Driving at a speed equal to or greater than 45 km/h over the designated speed limit.

Police must:

- ... Impound a vehicle for 28 days for the first offence
- ... Impound a vehicle for three months for a second offence.
- ... Upon conviction for a third or subsequent offence, as well as the normal penalties for the offence, a court may also order the permanent confiscation of the vehicle or its impoundment for up to six months.

Don't put up with it!

Report antisocial driver behaviour or speeding to police immediately on 13 14 44 or drop into a police station and complete a Traffic Incident Report if the incidents are ongoing and you have information on the offenders. Hoon report forms can also be downloaded from the WA Police website.

What information do police need from you?

When you Dob in a Hoon the more information provided, the better. Things to note include:

- ... Description of driving, for example, burnouts, drag racing
- ... Description of driver
- ... Date and time of offence
- .. Precise location of offence
- ... Vehicle details include registration, make, model and colour

Provision of photographic or video evidence is a powerful tool that can assist police with enquiries into hooning complaints, however, if you intend taking these images, please consider your safety and **do not** put yourself in any danger when taking them.
