The increase in pressure across the other properties watered at the same time could cause the system to trip out.




he reticulation season has been an on again off again affair over this spring with welcome rains giving Crestwood almost 25ml in November and an additional and unexpected boost in December. The

This means I have had no readout of how the system is performing, having to rely on the old system which is not as reliable as the computer generated graphs. This problem should be resolved in December. Once again I would ask residents to keep checking their reticulation to ensure it is in good order. Thanks to all who have done repairs.

The look of the underpasses has been improved with a new coat of paint and no longer presents the aged patchwork effect.

The parks have been fertilised and should recover in a couple of weeks time from the sudden bout of hot and windy weather we have had. The wind has also made a lot of mess around the estate, at times seeming like a never ending blizzard of leaves and twigs. There will be a three week interval to the mowing over the Christmas break with mowing commencing again on the third of January.

WORK FROM HOME SCAMS

1 Mystery shopper job: Mystery Shopping Inc. has been luring Australians through newspaper ads promising \$300 per completed "assignment". Applicants are asked to email their details to an overseas email address and receive traveller's cheques. Their first assignment is to note security and customer service details while cashing them. Afterwards, they can deduct their fee before transferring the leftover money back to Mystery Shopping by untraceable wire transfer. These cheques are forged, and you commit a crime when you cash them. You can also be held responsible for repaying the money to the business who cashed the cheque.

Online payment process job: An email job offer arrives from a company claiming to have found your resume on the Seek website. They offer you a position processing payments; only a little computer knowledge is required and you'll be paid daily with a minimum income of \$4000 per month. Typically you get another email saying there was a mistake and they had accidentally sent four times the amount of your paycheck. You're told to wire the rest of the money to someone else when you receive the cheque. The money you receive may have been stolen from other people's bank accounts.

BAC job offer: You receive an email directly addressed to you offering a job with the reputable WA company, RAC Finance, and promising \$3900 a month for only one or two hours work a day, four to five days a week. You're asked for your bank account details to receive payment that you're instructed to transfer to an account in Europe. With some of these scams, the initial money transferred to you is recalled once you've transferred it overseas.

Envelope stiffing/email processing scam: In 4 the old envelope-stuffing scam it was promised you would be sent up to 1000 stamped and addressed envelopes a week and that you would earn \$1-\$2 for every envelope stuffed. Once you pay the required fee, however, all you receive are flyer templates. You're told to put up the flyers on noticeboards asking people to send you \$2 in a preaddressed, prepaid envelope, you'll then send them a flyer. In a modern take on this, Project 21 placed online ads "Work from home processing emails. Earn up to \$5000 pm p/t" The catch is you're charged \$90 each for 12 manuals. The manual says to place ads like the one you responded to and sell copies of the manuals. The kit includes samples of the ads to adapt. If you follow this advice you're advertising a job that doesn't exist and breaking the law.

5 Affiliate marketing (upfront payment) scam: Schemes such as GoogleCash claim to enable you to create a "click through" portal that will supposedly generate a revenue stream for the buyer/job seeker. One unhappy customer reported to WA ScamNet that, after she paid for the starter kit, money was taken from her bank account another four times without her knowledge, and no kit arrived.

POLICE WATCH - Thornlie

31 October - 5 November: A vacant house in Rushbrook Way was broken into by smashing a window during the day on Thursday November 3. Nothing was stolen.

A lady was loading her shopping into her car at Thornlie Square on Thursday 3 November. Unfortunately she left her handbag on the car and a male person grabbed the bag and ran off.

During the night on Friday 4 November offenders removed a flyscreen from an open window in Geographe Way. This is a timely reminder, coming up to warmer weather, to lock your windows and doors, even when you are home, and especially when you go to bed. You should also close your curtains and blinds so thieves can't see in to decide whether to break in.

There were several burglaries in each of Gallant Court, Geographe Way and Matthew Way, and burglaries in Ripplewood Ave, Lyrebird Way, Gunn Crt, Gallant Crt and Shelburn Way.

6 November - **16** November: There has been a slow but steady rise in the number of cars being broken into across the whole metropolitan area. Often it is simply a case of a window being smashed, reaching in and taking something from the car. The prevalence of these offences can be linked to the advances in technology where valuable items are smaller, such as laptops, mobile phones, GPS units etc. It is astounding how often people leave such valuable items in plain view in their car, and on their return they are surprised to find their car broken into and the valuables stolen.

Prevention really is the best solution and the bulk of prevention needs to come from within the community. Look, Lock, Leave is still a valid strategy. Look inside your car for anything valuable and remove it. Lock your car, and as you Leave be aware of your surrounds.

Thornlie continues to be a focus for us. A house in Lyrebird way was broken into through a front window on Wednesday November 9, however no one was seen. On Friday November 11 offenders tried to force the back door of a house in Cameron Street. The occupants had some good quality security and the crooks didn't get in.

During the early hours on Sunday November 13 offenders broke into a house in Cornedale Place by removing the flyscreen to an open window. The thieves then took several items including the keys to a car that was subsequently stolen. The same day someone tried to break into a house in Merino Crt by forcing the back door, but again, the occupants had good quality security.

During the early hours of Monday November 14 an attempt was made to break into a shed in Heath Place, and during the day on Tuesday November 15 a house in Thornlie Ave had the front door forced to gain entry and a purse stolen.

17 November - 24 November: A house in Rushbrook Way was broken into on Thursday November 17 by forcing the front window. The offenders found keys to a car in the driveway, which they used to steal the car.

Three thieves stole a bicycle from the Thornlie Aquatic Centre on Thursday November 17. They were described as three dark skinned Australians, a very tall one aged 18 wearing a black Adidas jacket, a shorter one aged about 16 and another one aged about 14.

A house in Northwood Loop had tiles taken form the roof in an apparent attempt to break in. This occurred on November 21 and is similar to a few reported in Canning Vale as well.

The news isn't all bleak in Thornlie. On Wednesday November 23 Canning Vale Police conducted simultaneous search warrants on two houses in Merino Crt, resulting from public information. At one house we recovered a stolen motor bike as well as other property, and from the other house we seized a quantity of drugs.

Later that same afternoon we received a report of a male youth stealing a pink motor scooter from Thornlie Square. We had our All Terrain Vehicle patrols out along the river, and they located and arrested the thief (who wasn't hard to spot on a bright pink scooter). A 15 year old male from Thornlie was charged with stealing a motor vehicle and several driving offences.

On Thursday November 24 we received a call about youths tagging graffiti in Thornlie. When stopped by a member of the public, they threatened him with a knife. We had cars in the area and the offenders were immediately located and arrested.

25 November - 1 December. A house in Mallard Street had a glass door smashed at the rear of the house during the day on Friday November 25. Police spoke to the neighbours, who didn't see anything. During the day on Monday November 28 a house in Greenway Ave was broken into by offenders using a shovel left in the yard, to smash a bathroom window.

During the day on Tuesday November 29 we had three reports of houses being broken into through the roof. The houses were in Kurrajong Drive, Tritonia Rise, and McNamara Drive. If you see anyone on a house roof, even if they are wearing work clothes, reflective vests or have a van parked in the driveway, please call police on 131444. We would rather we spoke to them and confirmed they were bona fide, than not get a call at all.

September 2011

Committee Business:

Parks and Reticulation: Repairs are needed to one of the bores. General bore work is to be completed following Grant's suggestion.

Spraying and fertilising in the parks has been done, including the spraying of weeds behind Princeton Court.



Quotes for the painting of the ends of the underpasses have been received and tabled. The recommendation is to go with Design Paint at \$2750. Mike and Grant are to coordinate in overseeing this.

The property audit has been undertaken and letters are being prepared to go out to relevant homeowners. The assets list has been placed on the computer. Numbers of house lots outside the rear of houses facing the park is to go ahead when the weather fines up.

More vandalism has been noticed in the bushland. Additionally, wild weather has created a bit of a mess on the estate.

The issues surrounding Delvin's drivers licence and visa have now been sorted.

Pool: The tiling around the pool is proceeding at a slower pace than anticipated. It is still hoped to have everything completed by the opening date in mid October.

Solar heating for the toddler pool has been replaced and is working. Jason is organising the chlorine dosing system for the pools.

The pool passes are currently being prepared. A defibrillator has been ordered for the pool office. An article explaining its necessity and use will appear in the next issue of the *Crestwood News*.

Trevor Veen is organising the busy bee to open the pool for the season while Darren is overseas on holiday. An inflatable is scheduled for the pool on 13 November with a BYO picnic or barbecue to follow. This will go ahead as scheduled depending on the weather.

Aesthetics: The carport replacement on Coronet Court has been approved.

Social: Santa and Carols in the Park have been scheduled for Sunday, 18 December. Planned is a BYO picnic with barbecues available. The Guides are to be invited to do a sausage sizzle fundraiser.

October 2011

Committee Business:

Parks and Reticulation: We are waiting for a contractor to undertake work on painting of the underpass ends. The ends have been cleaned and prepared for painting. Additionally, a surveyor is required to do initial planning for future underpass development. A discussion was also held in the committee regarding the underpass areas that Crestwood is responsible for.

Fertilising of the parks has now been completed. Faults in the valves for the bores have be repaired and the start of the reticulation season has begun. The on-off times for the park lighting have also been adjusted.

Delvin has returned from 10 days leave.

Pool: Darren has expressed thanks to those who helped with the pool in his absence. The pool tiling work has now been completed. The defibrillator is now in the pool office and signs are to be laminated and put up regarding its availability and use.

Spare pool pass application forms and schedules are now kept at the pool office. Daphne has prepared a list for non-issue of pool passes.

Chris will be the attendant at the pool for six days a week. Jason has been asked to check the toddler pool heater for leaks.

Tea and coffee supplies are to be purchased for use at the pool. The staff are to be requested to try to keep the kitchen and office area tidy and clean. Responsibility for daily cleaning of the toilets is to fall to the pool attendant.

Aesthetics: A pool and fence application for Grenadier Drive has been received.

Financial: Various homeowners have been sent letters about overdue fees.

Social: The inflatable is scheduled to be at the pool on 13 November, weather permitting.

A request for a small group party has been approved.

Further discussion was held regarding Christmas festivities scheduled for Sunday 18 December. Agreement was reached to keep things simple.

General Business: Documents regarding committee procedures require some updating. Sandra is to search for electronic copies for Trevor to work through.

Planning structural changes to your property? Read This

The Crestwood management committee wishes to remind all homeowners who are planning to make improvements, structural alterations or any other changes to their property, to first contact the aesthetics committee member with your plans. This includes plans for fencing and major pruning or removal of trees.

While the committee wishes to support you in your desire to improve your property and lifestyle, all of us, as Crestwood homeowners, have obligations under the covenant that we signed on the purchase of our properties. It is important that any alterations be made in accordance with this covenant and that is why it is essential that the committee be contacted first before any plans are realised.

Disturbing to Others Phantom Door Knocking

A number of instances of what might be called 'phantom door knocking' has been brought to the attention of the Crestwood News. This is where someone knocks on a door, or loudly tries the doorknob as if trying to get in, and then runs off. When the homeowner opens the door or otherwise investigates, no one is there. This might happen once, or it might happen again to the same property a little bit later. It tends to occur just after sunset when it is has just become dark.

Crestwood has a number of homeowners who are elderly and others who live alone, and such behaviour has proven to be very disturbing to some. They feel their house, at best, is being watched and at worst is being targeted for a crime. A small group of young people has been seen moving along the streets where this has occurred, and they are suspected of being involved in these incidents..

If you are concerned about this behaviour, or if you suspect your house is being targeted to see if anyone is home, call the police on 13 14 44 immediately after the occurrence. If several incidents are reported as occurring on the same day, the police may consider it suspicious behaviour and initiate patrols to locate the youths. If you can see the youths close by after answering the door, you should ring the police immediately and report it.



The Crestwood Hall is available for use by residents. It is ideal for large or small functions: birthday parties, morning teas, playgroups, meetings. It can be hired on a one-off or regular basis. Charges are as follows.

Astwood Hall

Daytime (to 5pm) — \$11.00/hour to a maximum of \$55.00 Night-time (to midnight) — \$22.00/hour to a maximum of \$110.00.

Up to 50 people are allowed in the Hall. Full use of the kitchen is included for both day and night functions.

Commercial (for-profit events or those charging an entry fee) — \$25.00 per hour to a maximum of \$100.00 – 8am - 5pm A \$300 bond applies to all bookings made by homeowners and \$500 to those bookings made by tenants. A minimum cleaning charge of \$150 will be taken from the bond if the hall is not cleaned to a satisfactory standard.

RECIPES

Method & Ingredients

- 1. Position a rack in the upper third of the oven. Preheat the oven to 180°C. Grease baking sheets.
- 2. Beat on medium speed until lightened in colour and creamy: 225g unsalted butter, softened.
- 3. Sift over the top and beat until well combined: 135g icing sugar.
- 4. Stir in: 2 tps vanilla extract, 100g ground walnuts or ground blanched almonds.
- 5. Gradually sift over the top while stirring: 280g plain flour
- 6. Knead until well blended. Pull off generous 1 tbs pieces

of the dough, roll with your hands into a short rope and shape into crescents. Space 3 cm apart on the sheets. (If the dough is soft and hard to handle, refrigerate until slightly firm.)

7. Bake, 1 sheet at a time, until the crescents are faintly tinged with brown and slightly darker at the edges, 13 to 16 minutes; rotate the sheet halfway through baking for even browning.

8. Remove the sheet to a rack and let stand until the biscuits firm slightly. Transfer

the biscuits to racks to cool. Sift over the biscuits until evenly coated: 120g icing sugar.

9. Makes about 4 dozen 6 cm hiscuits

Beat in until very fluffy and well blended: 120g icing sugar, 1 egg yolk, 2 tbs brandy, 1 tps vanilla extract.

- Gradually add and stir until well blended and smooth: 420g plain flour, sifted.
- Cover and refrigerate the dough until firm enough to shape into balls, about 1 hour.
- To bake, position a rack in the upper third of the oven. Preheat the oven to 180°C. Grease baking sheets.
- 6. Pull off pieces of dough and roll between your palms into

generous 2.5cm balls. Space about 2.5 cm apart on the sheets. If desired, garnish the balls by inserting into the top of each: 1 whole clove.

7. Bake one sheet at a time, until the biscuits are faintly tinged with brown, 14 to 18 minutes;

rotate the sheet halfway through baking for even browning.

- Remove the sheet to a rack and let stand until the 8. biscuits firm slightly. Gently transfer the biscuits to racks to cool completely. Handle gently as these biscuits are fragile.
- 9. Sift over the biscuits until evenly coated: 90g icing sugar.
- 10. Makes about 4 dozen 2 cm biscuits.

Mother Kroll's Lebkuchen

Method & Ingredients

- 1. Position a rack in the centre of the oven. Preheat the oven to 200°C. Line a 33 x 23 cm baking pan with greased aluminium foil, allowing it to overhang the 2 narrow ends of the pan by about 5 cm
- 2. Bring to the boil in a large, heavy saucepan: 250 ml honey.
- Remove from the heat and let cool completely. Stir in: 150g light or dark brown sugar, 1 egg, lightly beaten, 1 tbs fresh lemon juice, 1 tps grated lemon zest.
- Combine and sift over the honey mixture: 350g sifted 4 plain flour, ¹/₂ tps bicarbonate of soda, 1 tps ground cinnamon, ¼ tps ground cloves, ½ tps ground allspice, 1/2 tps ground nutmeg.
- Sift together: 60g chopped, blanched almonds, 35g chopped citron. Add to the honey mixture and stir



until well blended. Firmly press the dough into the pan to form a smooth even laver. Bake until a toothpick inserted in the centre comes out almost clean, 18-20 minutes.

> 6. Meanwhile,, stir together until smooth: 180g icing sugar, 2 tbs fresh lemon juice, ¹/₄ tps vanilla extract. If necessary, stir in enough water to yield a spreadable consistency. 7. While the bar is still warm, spread the icing evenly over the top. Immediately mark into 5cm squares and decorate by placing in the centre of each square: 1 candied cherry. Arrange around each cherry in a X shape originating from each corner: 4 whole blanched almonds.

8. Remove the pan to a rack and let stand until completely cool and the icing is set. Using the overhanging foil as handles, lift the bar into a cutting board. Carefully peel off the foil, Cut into the marked squares. If possible, let the biscuits age for 2 weeks to allow the spices to ripen.

9. Makes 24 5x5 cm squares.

DRIVEN AWAY - EXILE OF THE MAGPIES

Chipita appeared without warning one day last September, very hungry and very noisy, running after any magpie willing to feed her. Her appearance was unexpected since all the other baby magpies appeared in January. When January finally did come, Chipita was joined by Beauty and Whitey. He did this for two weeks, always getting the timing exactly right, but then one day he became too relaxed and Ferrel spotted him from his perch on the Nicholii and plunged down viciously at him. Slurpie took off with Ferrel in close pursuit, and that was the last we saw of him.

And so this year, with three baby magpies in our garden, we could only assume that when April turned to May it would be their turn to be driven out of the group. Chipita grew up but never did shut up. She had to be the noisiest of all the magpies that had come to our garden. Even with food in her beak she would continue to whine, and when swallowing the sound would turn to a gurgle. Sitting alone on a branch was still not a time for silence, for there would always be a little whimper of sound.

Beauty and Whitey also developed their own personalities. Beauty was the most skittish and stayed the furthest away, rushing out from wherever she was hiding, seeking her bits of cheese, collecting one, two, three and even four pieces, before rushing back to enjoy them in the private shadow of a tree. Whitey was the plumpest of the lot with short, stumpy legs, and while not as nervous as Beauty, she could never bring herself to come close enough to eat from our hands. She would dash up close, then have a change of heart, and stand a few armlengths away waiting for a bit of cheese to be thrown to her.

May came, and the magpie world was still peaceful. Then winter set in, and the babies and adults would all appear together, dry or drenched depending on the weather. By August we had decided that these babies would be allowed to stay, and we relaxed and drew closer to them. And then one day, just at the start of September we heard that ominous cry, that magpie-tainted scream that echoed of threat and terror. It was happening all over again.

Chipita was suddenly caught in a frenzy of flapping black and white feathers. The family that had been her protectors during the early months of fledging and feeding, had now become her attackers. Big Daddy had Chipita by the legs, grasping and twisting so that she was thrown on her back, unable to right herself. The magpies, Ladybird, Ferrel and Cain drove into her with their beaks, pulling at her tail feathers, jabbing at her face, poking under her wings. Big Daddy, still holding tight, also bent forward from his outward position joining in the attack.

The cries were loud as the magpies lashed out, oblivious to the air and shrubs around them. Chipita continued her panicky wail, unsure why her protectors had turned so firmly against her. Then suddenly Big Daddy lost concentration and Chipita broke free, running first under a heavily branched grevillea and then flying off to the protection of a dense pine tree at the neighbours. Driving her that far away seemed to satisfy her attackers for now, and they flew off over the roof of our house and into the park.

This was an attack meant to drive Chipita from the group. It was not the fatal assault that magpies reserved for intruders into their realm, the brutal, bloody altercation that could leave the outsider blind, battered and frequently near death. No, Chipita was still family and would not be killed, just forcibly and painfully driven away. But what did exile mean for an isolated magpie that could only become an outsider in another group or live on the fringes of two groups, belonging to none?

By afternoon the cries began again. This time it was Beauty, calling from the Cinerea, hanging head down with her feet firmly held by Ferrel. But Ferrel was not alone, for there was also Cain pecking away at the helpless Beauty who could do nothing but hang and struggle. We witnessed all of this from below in the garden and decided, at least this once, to intervene. The battle branch was only midway up the tree and when we turned the hose on the three magpies, Beauty finally had a chance. Cain was the first to break off from the attack and fly back to the park. Ferrel held on longer, but then let go and Beauty quickly disappeared



across the street and into a shielding tree.

By late afternoon the three babies were back in the Cinerea. Chipita and Beauty had each experienced an attack. Whitey stayed unchallenged. Cringing when her siblings succumb to the violence of the adults, she had not yet had this violence turned on her. Whitey was clearly not being forced from the group.

The next day the babies ventured from the Cinerea into the park for this was their territory. Here is where the worms lay waiting to be pulled from the ground and the beetles lay hiding in the clumped blades of grass. This is where they could find the unfortunate skink running just a little too slowly into the bark crevice of a tree, a skink they could play with, pulling off its tail, pushing it along, holding it under one foot, and then, inevitably, scoffing it up with one quick flick of the beak. But today the territory was no longer theirs. The adults swooped down and drove them back into the Cinerea and there began another attack.

Seven of them dove into Chipita before realising that Beauty was getting free. Three then broke off and followed the screeching Beauty down to the end of the cul-de-sac, over the pathway to the pool and back into the Brazilian pepper tree, just heavy enough with foliage to foil any attempt to grab and hold her. These attacks eventually ended with Chipita and Beauty coming back to the Cinerea, Chipita with feathers sticking out to the left and right and a tail now greatly diminished, while Beauty, whimpering loudly, appeared unscathed. Whitey flew in to join them, inching her way along the branch she shared with Beauty. Whitey was to witness another week of these attacks before she disappeared, choosing the comfort of the adult magpies over the fraught world of her siblings.

The attacks continued for many more weeks and we intervened whenever we saw them. Sometimes all it took to distract the attacking magpies was for us to appear in the garden, for they flew to us for the little titbits of cheese. Sometimes aiding the beleaguered babies was harder. The adult birds, lost in their frenzy, might hardly acknowledge our presence. At those times only sharp claps would break their spell, or even a handful of wood chips thrown in their direction.

There was nothing the two babies could do to counter the attacks except to fly dropping and turning, fast and hard, to the nearest tree, desperately avoiding being dragged to the ground where the attack could only intensify. When they knew the adult birds were close and watching they took their well practised positions of subservience: head-up, breast down, and tail up and shaking. Even Chipita did her best to show she was no threat, although her tail feathers were vastly diminished. All this did absolutely no good, for the adults were still determined to drive them from the group and the territory.

We did our best to keep the babies around, and they treated the Cinerea in our front yard as a tree of sanctuary. At first they slept there, but it was far too open and they were far too exposed to feel safe. The dense pine or the Brazilian pepper tree at the end of Coronet Court became their sleeping place, but when morning came they returned to our yard and the Cinerea for their extra ration of cheese. And then one morning, looking out from breakfast, we saw the third baby. Whitey had returned, cheerfully scoffing up the cheese bits where she remembered she would find them, innocently cavorting with Beauty and Chipita. Whitey had returned for she too now was being driven away.

The three little ones still survive in a decreased territory at the end of the street, ever cautious as they dart from one side of the road to the other, poking their beaks into the gardens and lawns, calling and carolling loudly. The attacks have not quite ended, but they come less frequently and involve many fewer birds. Not all the adults threaten them, but neither are they allowed back into the group. How long this little bit of territory at the end of the cul-de-sac will remain theirs to roam it is impossible to know, but for now they seem to have accepted that space and each other for that space and each other is all they have.
