Major Capital Works Project Completed

Limestone Retaining Walls for Underpass D Now Finished

Our major capitol works development for this year has been completed with the construction of the limestone retaining walls on the northern side of Underpass D.

Our gardeners, Grant and Damyn, will be installing the reticulation, planting out the new gardens and sowing grass to complete the works on the bank adjoining the lower walls.

The unusual weather patterns have seen some warmer days of recent times with little rain. I have noticed that some of the parks are showing some dry patches.

Our reticulation will have started by the time you receive this newsletter so our gardens and lawns should recover from any stress they have experienced recently.

On the 20th September there was a small fire in the bushland. Thanks to residents near the bushland who managed to extinguish it quickly. I am informed the fire was started by children playing in the area after school.

Parents, if you are aware of your children playing in the actual bushland please caution them about doing so and in particular not to play with matches or other flammable materials. The reasons are twofold. The first is the risk posed to the children themselves, and the second is the possible destruction of native flora.

Hopefully everyone enjoyed, or survived, the Royal Show and school holidays.

The pool will be opening in a couple of weeks so I trust the weather is good and there are plenty of helpers for the busy bee to prepare it for use.

Lighting Survey — Results

Thank you to the 73 households that provided us with feedback regarding park lighting. Of these responses, approximately 50% were in favour of having the lights turned off during the night The Committee is unwilling to take any definitive action at this stage, as we feel that the number of responses was too few. We are, however, most appreciative of some of the very constructive comments and suggestions provided, and will aim to work through these in the coming months.

ecent correspondence from the Committee of the Crestwood Homeowners Association.

1. [A residence on Coronet Court] Thank you for your application for building approval accompanied by your plans and building licence from the City of Gosnells. I tabled the application at the committee meeting and your project was approved. We hope that all goes well with the construction of your new double garage which will increase the security and value of your home.

- 2. [A residence on Grenadier Drive] Thank you for your application to erect a fence on your rear boundary with Park 19. Your fence construction has been approved by the Committee. The open tubular fencing design is preferred to maintain the open appearance of the parks and gardens through Crestwood.
- 3. [A residence on Grenadier Drive] Thank you for your building application to erect a boundary fence between your garden and Park 21, and the conversion of the existing garage into a bedroom and en suite bathroom. The 1.2m open, painted, picket fence with timber posts and rails complies with the Crestwood fencing policy and has been approved by the Committee.

The proposal to convert the garage into a bedroom and en suite will have little impact on the external appearance of your home. The Committee agrees that aesthetically we would have no objection to the alteration, but your application will have to remain open until we receive copies of the approved plans and the building licence from The City of Gosnells. Once all the documentation is received approval will be confirmed.

4. [A residence on Cavalier Court] Thank you for your application to rebuild half of your boundary wall on park 25 which is leaning towards the park footpath. Your application was approved by the Committee.

The wall leaning over the footpath is considered to be a possible danger to the public. We will request our ground staff to erect a bunting to prevent people getting close to the wall, and ask you to carry out the rebuilding of the wall as soon as possible. We also request that the wall be rebuilt with bricks as close as possible to the same type and colour as the rest of the wall.

Work on the retaining walls at Underpass D has now been completed. When the reticulation is in place and working and the gardens are planted it, will be a great improvement to the area.

Parks & Reticulation

Our gardeners have been testing the reticulation system in preparation for the commencement of regular watering. A number of small issues have arisen with valves and sprinklers and they are being fixed. A small amount of fertilizer has been spread on the parks to assist with their recovery from the recent lengthy dry spell. It has been decided that the reticulation schedule will not be altered over the Christmas and New Year period. Residents scheduled to have their properties watered on the 24th and 31st of December will have their reticulation as usual.

After taking a walk recently to check on the retaining wall work I noticed that a good number of houses in Grenadier Drive backing onto the park with Regal Drive have bushes and trees that overhang the path at the rear of the homes, in some cases restricting the path to about half its actual width.

All homeowners or occupants are requested to check outside their rear fence and cut any overhanging bushes or trees so that the full width of the path is available for pedestrians.

NOTE: In the event this problem is not attended to in a reasonable time frame the occupant will receive a Committee authorised letter from the gardener to remedy the problem. If that letter is not complied with the work will be carried out and the owner or occupant billed for the cost of the work and removal fees.

INCIDENT REPORT

Incidents reported on the Crestwood Estate

The *Comment News* reported a vehicle theft on Princeton Ct in their 24 August issue.

A burglary occurred on Grenadier Dr during the week of 12 September. Entry was made through a closed bathroom window which was pushed in while occupants were at home. A number of valuable items were taken

A fire was lit in the Crestwood bushland on 20 September. The Fire Brigade was called but was unable to gain entry to the parks since their key did not fit the gate on Ovens Road. Neighbours on Grenadier Drive extinguished the fire using a fire extinguisher and buckets of water. The fire was believed to be lit by school children.

SCAMS

Every year, Australians lose millions of dollars to the activities of scammers who bombard us with online, mail, door-to-door and telephone scams.

Scams target people of all backgrounds, ages and income levels. Fake lotteries, advance-fee frauds, getrich quick schemes and miracle health cures are some of the favoured means of separating the unwary from their money. New varieties of these scams appear all the time.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) has seen the devastating effects scams can have on people and their families. One of the best ways to combat this kind of fraud is to help you take measures to prevent yourself being caught out in the first place.

If you want to stay on top of scams, visit the ACCC SCAMwatch website (www.scamwatch.gov.au). This site contains information on dozens of different scams targeting consumers and small businesses, tips on guarding against scams, victim stories from Australian consumers, regular scam alerts and advice on reporting a scam.

Myth Busters

Busting these common myths will minimise your chances of being scammed.

- ... All companies, businesses and organisations are legitimate because they are approved and monitored by the government. This is not always true. While there are rules about setting up and running a business or a company in Australia, scammers can easily pretend to have approval when they don't. Even businesses that do have approval to operate could still try and scam you by acting dishonestly.
- ... All internet websites are legitimate. This is not always true. Websites are quite easy and cheap to set up and there are not many checks in place to ensure that a website is legitimate.
- ... There are short cuts to wealth that only a few people know. This is not always true. Ask yourself the question: "If someone knew the secret to instant wealth, why would they be telling their secret to others?"
- ... Scams involve large amounts of money. This is not

always true. Sometimes scammers target a large number of people and try to get a small amount of money from each person.

... Scams are always about money. This is not always true. Some scams are aimed at stealing personal information from you.

Golden Rules

Remember these golden rules to help you beat the scammers.

- ... Always get independent advice if an offer involves money, time or commitment.
- ... There are no guaranteed get-rich-quick schemes. The only people who make money are the scammers.
- ... Do not agree to offers or deals straightaway. If you think you have spotted a great opportunity, insist on time to get independent advice before making a decision.
- ... Do not hand over money or sign anything until you have done your homework and checked the credentials of the company that you are dealing with.
- ... Do not rely on glowing testimonials; find solid evidence of a company's success.
- ... Log directly onto a website that you are interested in rather than clicking on links provided in an email.
- ... Never send money or give credit card or online account details to anyone you do not know and trust.
- ... If you spot a scam or have been scammed, get help. Contact the office of fair trading in your state or territory, the ACCC or the Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) for assistance.

Scammers are imaginative and manipulative. They know how to push your buttons to produce the response they want.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission has put out a very good booklet entitled **The Little Black Book of SCAMS: Your guide to scams, swindles, rorts and rip-offs.** Commonwealth of Australia, 2008. You should be able to find a copy at the Thornlie Library.



July 2010

Committee Business:

Parks and Reticulation: The quote for Underpass D has been received and accepted with work scheduled to begin after 17 August. Park paths in the area will be closed during the day and there is likely to be some disruption on Grenadier Drive.



Fortnightly testing of the reticulation system is continuing. The question raised at the AGM regarding reticulation over the Christmas / New Year's period will be addressed at the start of the next watering season.

A complaint about children playing in the pepper tree was received approximately two weeks ago.

Information about acquiring exercise equipment for the parks is to be included in the next newsletter, as well as a survey about park lights.

Pool: The quote from Vision Ceramic for retiling the toddler's pool has come in at an estimated price of \$7.500. Barry has recommended acceptance of this and agreement has been made to go ahead with the work.

Pool rules are to be discussed with Belgravia staff. The contract with Belgravia has yet to be officially signed. Barry is to check on getting a slow starter for the pool pump.

Information about the new swimming season and applications for pool passes are to be distributed with the next edition of the *Crestwood News*.

Tenants using the pool are to be asked to provide a copy of their lease documents before pool passes will be issued. Passes are to be prepared only for adults listed on the lease agreement and their immediate children living at the property. Barry is to work through changes required to the paperwork.

Aesthetics: An email has been received regarding a home for sale and the issue raised has been addressed by Trevor.

Finance: Revision of the gardeners salary is to be discussed at the next meeting.

Social: No social events have been scheduled and a coordinator is still required.

General Business: The City of Gosnells has submitted a proposal about heritage listing the Crestwood Hall. Trevor is to follow up on this.

The question of speeding on the local streets is ongoing.

August 2010

Committee Business:

Parks and Reticulation: The question of reticulation for Christmas and New Year will be addressed closer to the beginning of the next watering season.

The survey sheets for the park lighting have been returned. The secretary will prepare a summary of the results for inclusion in the next newsletter.

No reticulation problems have been reported.

Pool: Problems exist with the toddler pool refurbishment. A number of issues still need addressing with Belgravia. An agreement is yet to be officially signed and a certificate of currency is required. Accounts, however, have been coming in from Belgravia which has raised questions of frequency and timing.

Aesthetics: Approvals for a variety of projects have been given, including garage work on Coronet Court, and fence on Grenadier Drive.

Finance: The anniversary of the gardener's service will be considered August when he first took over the full-time position. His pay is to be increased by \$1.00 an hour backdated to August. Damyn is to be approached regarding permanent part-time work.

The Multi-Turf billing cycle has changed.

We need to take into account the cost of rates not previously included in the budget. Trevor will check on the possibility of being charged at a lesser rate. Our property is currently being charged at gross rental value even though it is not property which is rentable or saleable.

General Business:

The photocopier is no longer functioning and in need of repair. Discussions were held regarding the value of repairing and keeping it, the use made of it and what could replace it. Grant is to be asked to put it out for collection in the general waste pick-up. There are no immediate plans to replace it.

The motorised bike and trail bike riders have been identified. The parents and/or owners are to be notified. Street and verge parking issues have been noted in some areas.

Rubbish bins are being left out well after collection day. A notice is to go in the next newsletter asking people to keep bins hidden from the road and to bring them in promptly after being emptied.

Visitors Business: Mike Bernouli is considering the position of Parks and Reticulation. He has lived on the estate for 11 years and will talk to Rob to find out more about what the job entails. There are also some details about eligibility to be considered.

Rubbish Bins

A reminder to residents on the Estate that under the covenant, rubbish bins must be kept out of sight except on collection day.

This means:

- they should not stored so as to be visible from the road
- they should not be left on the roadside after collection day.

- ... Recycling bins containing non-recyclables will not be emptied.

The Crestwood Hall is available for use by residents. It is ideal for large or small functions: birthday parties, morning teas, playgroups, meetings. It can be hired on a one-off or regular basis. Charges are as follows.

> Daytime (to 5pm) — \$11.00/hour to a maximum of \$55.00 Night-time (to midnight) — \$22.00/hour to a maximum of \$110.00.

Up to 50 people are allowed in the Hall. Full use of the kitchen is included for both day and night functions.

Commercial (for-profit events or those charging an entry fee) — \$25.00 per hour to a maximum of \$100.00 - 8am - 5pm A \$300 bond applies to all bookings made by homeowners and \$500 to those bookings made by tenants. A minimum cleaning charge of \$150 will be taken from the bond if the hall is not cleaned to a satisfactory standard.

Hall hire does not include access to the pool area. For children's parties there is a minimum adult supervision requirement. To book or obtain further information call Marjan: 9459 8776




